Design a digital tattoo

What goes on the internet stays on the internet, kind of like how a tattoo on the skin stays on the skin. Using a form of technology or app, design a digital tattoo with a cyber safety slogan underneath.

- make the digital tattoo your brand and list ways to keep it 'safe' on the internet
- make a set of Digital Tattoos with different messages these could be made into badges, posters etc.

eSmart Digital Licence for cyber safety

Continue to build a cyber safe community and upskill staff, users and students by using the 10 question, eSmart Digital Licence sample quiz.

The eSmart Digital Licence is an online challenge which encourages young people how to play, learn and socialise online in a smart, safe and responsible way – reach out to your wider community and invite school/library/community groups to try the quiz as well. If they think they know it all, then they'll have nothing to lose! It's great for adults and you'll be surprised how much you learn.

Cyber buddy activity (junior/middle school)

Draw what it looks like for someone to spend too much time online (tired, yawning, red eyes, sore head etc.) and someone who has a balanced time online (outside playing, doing homework on the iPad, playing in the local soccer team).

My digital footprint 1 (Primary)

Help children understand the reasons why we should always think before sharing things online. Use the <u>template provided</u> to help and discuss the best options.

My digital footprint 2 (Primary)

Using the template provided, with thought bubbles (<u>boys</u> and <u>girls</u>), discuss things you would do and ones you would never do. There are follow up discussion options such as why would you do it? Why wouldn't you do it? What might be the consequences?

Safe online behaviours (Primary)

Using the safe/unsafe list of online behaviours, sort and discuss why.

Digital reputation

Tagged photos, social networking interactions and blog posts shape perceptions online. It is critical that digital citizens think about the footprint they are leaving online in order to maintain a positive digital reputation.
