<u> Pre-season Trial Game – 27 January 2018</u>

Vertical tutoring cricket style came to St Paul's on 27 January 2018 when a compilation of players ranging from Grade 8 to Grade 12 came together for a 40 over aside cricket game under the tutor ledge of Head of Cricket, Mr Lachlan Sykes.

The weather was perfect for cricket and the main oval wicket was a credit to grounds staff. Despite having not been cut or rolled since mid-March 2017 the first pitch was well rested and came up well.

St Paul's Red reached 8 for 127 after the allotted 40 overs with solid batting from Captain Billie & Ben leading the way for their team. St Paul's Green returned serve with 9 for 211 with Captain Sam & Zane leading the way in scoring more than a few boundaries.

The winner was cricket and the opportunity for the younger players to play on the main oval with the older boys was invaluable. Vertical tutoring cricket style looks here to stay and the season is off to a terrific start.

Next assignment for the St Paul's 1sts was the annual Wanderers fixture on 31 January 2018. Fair to say the boys got some cricket lessons last year – let's see what the 2018 game throws up!
