The best way to find out about a job is to try it

The best way to explore a job you are interested in is to try it. This sounds obvious, doesn't it? However, it is often the last thing people think of when exploring jobs and making career decisions. The following are ways you can try a job.

- Work observation/shadowing spend one or two days with someone already in the job
- Work experience spend up to a week working in the job
- Volunteering volunteer your services to an organisation that has jobs you are interested in
- Part-time paid work explore the possibility of part-time or casual work in your preferred career area
- Join an activity group where you can try out some of the skills you will need in the job you like e.g. join the Air Force Cadets or the St John Ambulance Cadets
- Participating in various programs associated with specific career areas e.g. Engineering Link projects

The benefits of trying a job are:

- Learning about what the job involves
- Having a structured, supervised, hands-on experience
- Experiencing a work environment the world of work isn't like school!
- Gaining a new referee to add to your resume
- Developing contacts that may help you gain employment in the future.

- Where are you heading? have some idea of your career direction (you don't have to know the destination yet). Think of what you love doing and train, practice, learn and rehearse
- Inspiration research people who have made it in the creative industries. Read their blogs and follow them on Instagram. Take every opportunity to talk to people who make a living from their creative talents
- Information find out more from industry associations. You'll find links to professional associations on most of the myfuture occupation pages e.g. professional associations for Set Designer include the Media, Entertainment and Arts Alliance and the Design Institute of Australia
- What's in demand? look for areas of demand, or that might be growing. Look for the trends and then advance them

- You've gotta eat! be prepared to work more than one job. Creative careers often take a while to become established. Find something that you're happy to do to support yourself, while having enough time and mental space to invest in your art
- Internships and volunteering this is about getting experience, building your reputation and getting to know people in the industry
- **Get some business skills** you'll need them! Learn the basics of business management so you can make some money from what you do
- Hear from people who are working as creatives find out how they first started. Learn from them
- **Unconventional and unafraid** marketing and business skills are essential. You need to be savvy and be wired to the best way to sell your skills
- Be the one be the one who succeeds in a creative career. Make sure it is you!
- Last words: be real be authentic. Being yourself in your art is the greatest thing you can give to the world

12 industries to watch for future jobs

The Careers FAQs team analysed reports from internationally known experts to come up with 12 industries they believe are going to be the next 'big thing'. They list and back up their selection in <u>Jobs of the Future</u>: The 12 Industries to Watch. The industries are:

- Artificial Intelligence (AI) AI technology has improved in leaps and bounds over the last few years, and is expected to evolve even more rapidly in 2017 and beyond.
- Drones The drone industry is set to boom by 6,000% by the end of the decade.
- Virtual reality See the Facebook demonstration of augmented social reality in the article.
- Wearables technology Estimated to be worth \$14 billion at present, the wearables industry is expected to grow to a staggering \$34 billion by 2020.
- Mobile payments Mobile payments are set to increase in the future.
- Cryptocurrencies Just like the internet revolutionised the way we communicate (making it possible
 to speak to anyone in the world, anywhere, anytime), cryptocurrencies allow us to transfer money
 instantly to anyone in the world, anywhere, anytime.
- Genomics The branch of molecular biology concerned with the structure, function, evolution and mapping of genomes could be the next trillion-dollar industry of the future.
- Internet of Things (IoT) Currently there are 8.4 billion devices connected to the internet. Last year the world's connected devices managed to outpace the world's population.
- Robotics Robots are already manufacturing shoes for us, greeting patients at our hospitals, and even making pizzas for us.
- Connected Home From roof tiles that store and convert solar power to smart ovens that recognise food (and automatically cooks it for you!), homes of the future will take convenience and efficiency to a whole new level.
- Driverless cars In the future, expect to use a network of fully autonomous cars to get from A to B.
- 3D printers From houses to organs, 3D printers will revolutionise many industries.

Main tasks performed

Global Recruiting Trends 2018

A recent <u>LinkedIn Blog: Global Recruiting Trends 2018</u> looked at how interview processes are changing along with the job market. More than ever, companies are on the hunt for employees with stellar soft skills, but they're struggling to find them. In fact, more than 60% of recruiters indicated that soft skills don't always come across during the interview process. The article collates feedback from recruiters and managers worldwide on how they are screening candidates. They provide the following highlights:

- **Traditional interviews still lead the way** including phone screens, structured and panel interviews, as well as work assignments
- New tools on the block to identify the best candidate for the job include: soft skill assessments, meeting in a more casual setting and leveraging virtual reality
- The future of the interview expect to see more comprehensive, research-based interview tactics like job auditions, soft skill evaluations and virtual reality assessment

So what's changing and how can you be prepared?

- **Prepare for behavioural interview questions:** Behavioural interview questions can be the toughest part of the interview and top the list for what hiring managers use to evaluate soft skills. Often, they're looking for skills such as teamwork, leadership, and time management.
- **Highlight the right skills:** It may not always be a real person doing the first scan of your interview, often technology systems take the first pass to make sure candidates have what the company is looking for. This means the content in your resume is important.
- **Talk to someone with the right insight.** There's nothing more valuable than a conversation with someone who has the insight you need to take the next step in your career.

Queensland Government Certificate 3 Guarantee

You may wish to investigate if you are eligible for the <u>Queensland Government</u>, <u>Certificate 3 Guarantee</u> program. The Certificate 3 Guarantee supports eligible individuals to complete their first post-school Certificate III level qualification and increase their skills to move into employment, re-enter the workforce or advance their career. The program also supports school students to access training and Queensland's Year 12 graduates to transition to employment by providing fee-free training in high priority qualifications. Want to be a paramedic? Become a St John Ambulance cadet

Young people between 11 and 18 years can apply to be a cadet. Activities include learning first aid, providing first aid services at public functions and competing in first aid competitions. For more information, visit the St John Ambulance website.

What is surveying?

Surveying is related to the broad areas of Spatial Science and Geospatial Science. If you are familiar with Google Earth and know what a GPS is, you already know about Spatial Science. Spatial means the relative place or location of something. Spatial Science helps us understand the relationship between the community and the environment to help predict trends and patterns. Visit the <u>Destination Spatial website</u> for more information on Spatial Science.

The main Surveying specialisations are Land, Mining, Engineering and Hydrographic. Land surveyors, like most surveyors, work in the office and in the field. In the field, they use the latest technology such as high order GPS, Robotic Total Stations (Theodolites) and aerial and terrestrial scanners to map an area, making computations and taking photos as evidence. In the office, surveyors use sophisticated software, such as Auto-cad to draft plans and map the onsite measurements. Surveyors work on a diverse variety of projects from land subdivision and mining exploration, to tunnel building and major construction, which means lots of variety. In Queensland, the University of Southern Queensland (USQ) offers the following courses, on-campus or by distance education, at its Springfield and Toowoomba campuses:

- Associate Degree of Spatial Science Major Surveying

- Bachelor of Spatial Science Technology Major Surveying.

Other universities in Queensland may offer aspects of Spatial Science within their Engineering, Science and Environmental Science courses or within a Geography major.

Applications opening soon for the Tuckwell Scholarship

If you are awarded a Tuckwell Scholarship you will receive \$21,700 per year (2017 rate) for the length of your undergraduate degree studies at the Australian National University (ANU) in Canberra. In addition, you will be in a group of motivated young people who want to use their abilities to make a difference in the world. The scholarship is unique in that it allows you to study a single or double undergraduate program, including honours and vertical degrees (degrees that combine undergraduate and graduate study, across a range of disciplines, completed in a reduced time-frame) in any discipline offered at ANU for up to five years. The application consists of a three-stage process.

- Stage 1 Initial Application: applicants submit a written online application and nominate a teacher to provide a reference. Applications for Stage 1 open on 5 March and close on 22 March 2018.
- Stage 2 If your Stage 1 application is shortlisted you will be sent a link to the Stage 2 application form which you will be able to complete online.
- Stage 3 75 applicants from Stage 2 are selected for individual and group interviews to be held in Canberra in July 2018.

The selection panel is looking for bright students, but not necessarily those with OP1. They will be looking at applicant attributes, interests and achievements as well. Visit the <u>scholarship site</u> for information about the selection criteria and the application.

Gap years - Make them Meaningful with a Purpose

Recent <u>research</u> from Canada suggests that taking a year off after Year 12 does not necessarily assist students who are unsure of their career path. Without a plan, a year out of formal education can be characterised by few ambitions or aspirations about how this time is spent. Alternatively, a formal gap year is known to offer many significant benefits. A formal gap year involves students in structured activities such as paid-work, volunteering and other forms of self-development related to possible future career options. This type of gap year enables students to try out a range of activities that can assist them in their career decision making. According to the research, students who have a purposeful gap year are less likely to drop out of further study pathways.

High School Volunteer Projects

Projects Abroad have recently announced their High School Projects for Summer 2018/19. These projects are designed for Year 10 and 11 students and consist of two-week group trips to locations in Cambodia, Nepal, Fiji, Samoa, Sri Lanka and Thailand. How does a gap year help your career?

An article on the <u>Go Overseas website</u> suggests that a purposeful and structured gap year can help your career in the following ways:

- A gap year is a chance to really discover yourself away from the crowd and noise. Self-awareness is an important skill for career decision making.
- When selecting a gap year, people tend to follow their hearts, finding opportunities that naturally correspond with their interests, passions, or hobbies. This provides an opportunity to check out potential careers.



Certificates, Diplomas and Bachelor Degrees – How are they different?

In Australia, we have a national system of qualifications called the Australian Qualifications Framework (AQF). At the end of Year 12, you can apply for the following qualifications from the Framework. These qualifications can differ in length, content and competitiveness as shown below.

- Bachelor Degree: Usually 3-5 years full-time (or part-time equivalent); theoretical; entry is usually competitive.
- Associate degree/Advanced diploma: Usually 2 years full-time (or part-time equivalent); combination of theory and practice; range from not competitive to very competitive depending on the topic.
- **Diploma**: Can be 1-2 years full-time (or part-time equivalent); tend to be practical with some theory; range from not competitive to very competitive depending on the topic.
- Certificates I, II, III, IV: 1 month 1 year full-time; usually very practical; usually not competitive.

The different levels of qualifications on the AQF are a bit like a ladder. You can use one level to help you gain entry to a higher level of study in the future depending on your results and the rules of the institution you want to gain entry to. To decide on the best level of qualification for you, consider:

- The study/training requirements of the job you want
- Your past study results
- Whether you are a hands-on (practical) or theory person
- The cost of the course
- The length of time you are prepared to study.

Senior External Examination registrations open for 2018

Year 12 students are eligible to sit a maximum of two <u>Senior External Examinations</u> if they can't study the Authority subjects offered in Queensland because the subject is not taught at their school or there is a timetable clash. The external examination subjects available are Accounting, Ancient history, Arabic, Biology, Chemistry, Chinese, English, Korean, Legal Studies, Mathematics A, Mathematics B, Modern Greek, Modern History, Philosophy and Reason, Physics, Polish, Punjabi, Russian, Spanish, Vietnamese, Visual Art. The examinations are held in October and November.

You will need the permission of your school to sit for these exams. Your school will register you for the exams with Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA). Registrations close on 30 April 2018. Read the information on the QCAA website and see your school Guidance Counsellor/Officer for more information.



Concentration – how to improve it

Concentration is the ability to focus and control your attention. Some people seem to be born with it, the rest of us have to learn how to do it. The good news is that anyone can improve his/her ability to concentrate. The following are strategies to help you get there.

- Make sure you get plenty of sleep. It is difficult to concentrate when you are tired. Regular exercise and healthy eating are also important
- Set realistic and specific study goals for yourself (e.g. I will go up one grade in English next exam)
- Develop regular habits of study same desk, same time, etc
- Work in a place that is free of distractions (in front of the TV is probably not the best place!). Decluttering your desk will help too
- When you sit down to study, make a plan of what you want to achieve that session and cross off items as you complete them
- If you find yourself distracted by something else (e.g. I feel fat; I should do more exercise), jot down the task, idea or problem to deal with later
- Begin working immediately don't wait for inspiration
- Attend to one thing at a time
- When you start to lose focus, get up and take a walk

Growing Leaders

The first step in anyone's leadership journey is self-leadership. We must be able to lead *ourselves* before we can lead anyone else. In fact, the effects of leaders who don't have strong character, core values, mental toughness, or integrity can be devastating. Whether in communities, families, churches, or schools, leaders lacking these characteristics can have a negative influence on those around them. *The Art of Self-Leadership*, Dr. Tim Elmore seeks to equip today's students to graduate with strong character, a healthy personal identity, and self-discipline. Finally, the article makes the point that Year 12 results aren't the end of the world. They don't determine a student's future success in life.

Updates from the University of Queensland (UQ)

<u>Rural Access Scheme</u> – UQ supports applicants from Australian rural and regional areas by boosting their entry score for a number of undergraduate programs. Rural areas of Australia often have restricted or limited access to educational opportunities, resources and health services compared with those available in

cities or larger towns. To help address these challenges, and if eligible, two bonus rank points/adjustment factors will be added onto your entry rank for the programs below. *Please note that bonus rank points/adjustment factors are not added onto OP scores. Each OP score is converted to an entry rank – and bonus rank points/adjustment factors are added to these. Students are then assessed based on their new rank. Situational Judgement Test for Bachelor of Veterinary Science (Honours) from 2018 – Program Update.

In 2018, The University of Queensland will be introducing an additional entry requirement for prospective students applying for the Bachelor of Veterinary Science (Honours). This change will impact current Year 12 students applying for study in 2019. This new entry requirement, a Situational Judgement Test (SJT), is an on-line, video-scenario based test with 12 sections and open-ended questions. The University recognises that attributes such as resilience, critical thinking and communication skills that are essential for veterinarians are not reflected in academic performance alone. The SJT will be used to assist in the selection of a student cohort best equipped for the rigours of the profession.

The test will be held between July and September 2018 with multiple tests dates. Students need to have access to a computer with reliable internet connection, a web-cam and hold photo identification and can be completed at home or at a library/community centre or another suitable location. The cost to complete the test is approximately \$80 and students should allow 90 minutes to complete the test. Further details about how and when to complete the SJT will be available soon on the Bachelor of Veterinary Science Honours webpage. Year 12 subject Bonus Schemes - Bonus Points to be replaced by Adjustment Factors

Traditionally, <u>Year 12 subject bonus schemes</u> allowed students to gain bonus rank points for successfully completing specific Year 12 subjects and through other university specific schemes. The bonuse rank points made students more competitive when applying for entry to university and/or TAFE Queensland.

According to the QTAC Assistance Schemes website:

- To get Year 12 subject bonuses, you must be a current Year 12 student
- Institutions decide which subjects they give bonuses for, and how many
- You should check each institution to determine whether Year 12 subject bonuse ranks are added to selection ranks for other qualifications such as certificates III or IV or music qualifications etc

In June 2018, Bonus Points will be replaced by Adjustment Factors across all Australian universities. As mentioned above, Adjustment Factors will continue to help you gain entry into university courses. If you are eligible for Adjustment Factors your position on the merit scale for entry into a course will be 'adjusted' to give you a new, more competitive score.

Universities award Adjustment Factors for a variety of reasons and programs so you will have to enquire with every university you are interested in attending, to fully understand their eligibility requirements. The process for applying for 'Adjustment Factors' may vary so it's important that you start your research now.
