Pre-apprenticeship courses at TAFE Queensland SkillsTech

Doing a pre-apprenticeship course has many advantages. They include:

- Helping you gain skills and a basic understanding of the job and industry
- Improving your chances of gaining an apprenticeship, as an employer is more likely to take on someone who has some knowledge of the industry and the skills required
- Saving time on your apprenticeship, as part of the first stage of apprenticeship training is completed within the pre-apprenticeship course.

In addition, at the end of your pre-apprenticeship course, SkillsTech's 'Find an Employer service' will help connect you with an employer. For a list of pre-apprenticeship courses on offer at SkillsTech, visit the website and click on 'Pre-apprenticeship courses'.

If you are interested in starting a full-time pre-apprenticeship course in January 2019, ring SkillsTech on 1800 654 447 as soon as possible to express an interest in a course or, if enrolments are open, to enroll.

How do I find a job with good employment prospects?

Rapid changes in the world of work and emerging new technologies mean that we need to try and stay ahead of the game by looking for occupations that have better job prospects than others. How do we do this? We should be taking the following factors into account when looking for a job with good employment prospects:

- **Number of people** The more people employed in an occupation, the more likely there will be jobs in every location.
- **Employment growth** Historical information tells us how many new jobs have been created in an occupation. Projected growth information can indicate how many additional jobs there are likely to be in the future.
- **Skills shortages** These indicate good opportunities in an occupation for people with the skills and experience needed. Shortages vary by location and change over time.
- **Job turnover** This is the annual percentage of employees who move out of the occupation into other occupations, retirement or unemployment plus employees who change jobs within the same occupation. Turnover creates opportunities in all occupations when employees need to be replaced.

Where can I find this information about the jobs I'm interested in?

- <u>myfuture</u> website Sign up for free if this is your first time on the website. Go to the Occupations section and search for your job of interest. Click on the 'Prospects' tab.
- Job Outlook provides occupational information including job prospects.
- The <u>Australian Jobs</u> publication provides information about the labour market for industries and occupations as well as states, territories and regions of Australia. It also provides occupational and industry information that will help you understand where the jobs will be in the future.
- The <u>Labour Market Information Portal</u> provides you with up-to-date information about your local labour market. It provides information at the national, state and regional level.
- <u>Department of Employment National, state and territory skill shortage information</u> provides skill shortage lists for the state, territory and national levels.

Some cautions:

- Fast growth within an occupation does not guarantee more job opportunities because the number of people seeking work may outnumber the job openings.
- Even occupations with declining job prospects can offer job opportunities as people move across jobs.
- It is difficult to accurately predict long term job prospects. Unexpected events can have an enormous impact on the labour market (e.g. very few people predicted the global financial crisis).

Consequently, when you are making career decisions, job prospects are just one piece of information you need to consider. Other information includes your interests, skills, values, aspirations, work preferences, education and training requirements. 9



Graduate Stats and Salaries

Knowing the destination of graduates in the university courses you are considering can be helpful for your decision making. Graduate Careers Australia (GCA) surveys university graduates throughout Australia. Participants are asked about themselves, including whether they are in full-time or part-time employment, in further full-time study, or are unavailable for either. The survey findings on 40 fields of education, from Accounting to Visual and Performing Arts, can be accessed from the GCA website. Salary levels are included.

Skills for getting a job – full-time/part-time/casual

What are employers looking for?

The findings of a Department of Employment survey of employers' recruitment experiences suggests that, for school leavers, they are looking for:

- **Experience** through work experience, voluntary work or transitional jobs (jobs you get before the job you really want). Experience is essential for some jobs.
- **Employability skills** team work, communication and initiative. You need to be able to demonstrate these to employers (i.e. tell them when you used these skills and how successful they were)
- **Personality attributes** enthusiasm, reliability, presentation and a good work ethic. You are unlikely to get the job if you don't display these traits.
- Education and training complete Year 12 and gain a post-school qualification. Depending on the job you are seeking, Pre-apprenticeship Certificates, Certificates III and IV, Diplomas and Degrees open the door to more job opportunities.

ANU: National University Scholarship

The Australian National University (ANU), located in Canberra, annually offers the National University Scholarship based on academic excellence in secondary school studies. Selection is based on an ATAR of 99.90 and above (or equivalent OP). The scholarship is valued at \$12,500 per annum paid for up to 5 years. You don't apply for this scholarship. All eligible applications made with ANU as a first, second or third preference when applying through UAC will be automatically considered. Visit the ANU Scholarship page for more information.

Education Scholarships

Applications are now open for the Department of Education's 2019 scholarship and grant programs. These scholarships and grants reinforce the department's dedication to providing the best teachers for all state schools while promoting teaching as a career path. The scholarships and grants on offer include:

- the <u>Aspiring teacher grants</u> which support high-achieving secondary graduates from 2018 commencing their studies to become a teacher in 2019,
- the <u>Pearl Duncan teaching scholarships</u> support Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people to gain an initial preservice teacher education qualification, and also.
- for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people is the <u>Lambert McBride Perpetual Bursary</u> which will provide a one-off grant to assist with tertiary expenses for study in any discipline,

How to save money when you're a student who basically earns burger rings

Although saving money as a student may seem impossible, once you try some of the following tips, it won't seem so hard. Try one of the tips below for a month and see how much money you save.

- Set goals A goal might be as simple as buying text books, or as exciting as organising that once in a
 lifetime trip to Europe. Whatever your goal, use it to develop a weekly savings target. Start with
 saving \$10 \$20 a week and see how it adds up.
- Student discounts Whether you are going to the movies, booking flights, getting a haircut or even servicing your car, there is bound to be a student discount available if you just take the time to look. Make sure you check out Student Edge (click on 'Deals'). This is a great site which is constantly updating the range of discounts available to students.

- Uni/college necessities Be smart: there is no shame in buying second-hand items. Check out your institution's book store for a second-hand section. Look on noticeboards around the campus for text book ads. Remember to sell your text books as soon as you have finished with them.
- Leave the credit card behind Consider cash-only outings with friends. This way you can easily avoid spontaneously shouting the entire bar a round of drinks.
- Quit online shopping Not only will you save money, you'll also cut down on the pile of dud
 purchases sitting at the bottom of your wardrobe that you (let's be honest) have no intention of
 returning.
- **Student services** While services differ between institutions, most are likely to offer free help and advice about money management, legal advice, health services, moving out of home support, scholarships and travel.

Queensland Government: Aspiring Teacher Grants 2019

The Queensland Government is again offering grants of \$2,500 for up to 25 high-achieving secondary students commencing their initial tertiary studies in 2019 with a teacher education program in Queensland. A further 25 grants of \$5,000 will also be available for year 12 graduates coming from a rural or remote location who receive an OP of 1-6. 

The Drone Industry

Did you know there is a Drone Industry? According to the <u>UAVAIR website</u> the number of companies employing professional drone pilots is doubling each year. This growth is in sectors such as drone photography and videography, real estate, industrial inspections, 3D mapping, surveying, emergency services, scientific research, agriculture and environmental monitoring. The Retail Industry

The Retail sector is one of Australia's largest employers with almost 1.5 million people employed in the industry with a high degree of casual, part-time and seasonal employment. This is the largest employing industry of workers aged 15-24 years. Soft skills are very important in this industry. You must be able to communicate well with customers, work in a team, and may need good numeracy skills to be able to handle money. Jobs in this industry include:

- Checkout Team Worker
- Customer Service Assistant
- Pharmacy Assistant
- Sales Representative
- Food Sales Assistant
- Retail Supervisor and Manager
- Visual Merchandiser.

Five podcasts every university student should be listening to

This is from the <u>Good Universities Guide website</u>. The podcasts listed are:

<u>TED Radio Hour</u> – This is a 60-minute program that focuses on a theme and incorporates soundbites and snippets from various TED Talks on the same subject.

<u>Stuff You Should Know</u> – In this podcast, you can learn about almost anything. The subjects range from Satanism, public broadcasting, disco, exorcism and even restaurant health inspections.

<u>Dr Karl Kruszelnicki's Science Hour</u> - Australia's foremost commentator on all things scientific, Dr Karl comes up with the answers to some of your most obscure questions.

<u>The Barefoot Investor</u> – Presenter, Scott Pape, has been voted Australia's most trusted finance expert. He produces 30-minute segments dedicated to helping millions of people save money and become fiscally independent.

<u>Trace</u> - If you know anything about podcasts, you've probably heard about Serial, the investigative journalism series that follows the murder of a high school student in Baltimore in 1999. Trace puts an Australian spin on the same genre. It is an ABC-produced look at the unsolved murder of Melbourne woman Maria James 37 years ago.

General tips for a successful transition to university

- Familiarise yourself with the campus before the semester starts.
- Attend Orientation week events. This is where you find out about the student support services, social clubs and other activities available at your university. Check out the Career and Employment Services. These are the people who can help you get a job.
- Identify any study skills you need to polish up on and book into a workshop.
- Register with your university's disability services if applicable.
- See the university's financial or counselling services if you are worried about money or you have other concerns.
- Find students in the same course and attend student-run social activities.
- Visit the library (virtual and physical) and attend workshops on how to use the library effectively.
- Attend all tutorials.
- Don't be afraid to ask for help.

How does QTAC work out if you'll get an offer?

QTAC uses eligibility and merit to decide if you can get into a course. Eligibility is determined by prerequisites and the institution's admissions rules. Merit is based on your OP or selection rank. More details about this process can be accessed on the Entry requirements webpage. You can go into your QTAC Application Services account to check the status of the courses you have applied for.

How will I know if I have an offer?

QTAC will send you an email (or an SMS). In most cases, you will have four days to respond. It is essential to monitor your emails to avoid missing an offer. If you don't respond by the due date, your offer will lapse and your application will become inactive. If this happens, contact QTAC immediately, as they may be able to reinstate your offer.

Offers for Year 12 students

Students applying for courses not requiring Year 12 results will start to receive their offers from Friday 16 November 2018 (your last day at school). Offers will be made between the release of Year 12 results on 15 December 2018 and the 16 January 2019offer round. Don't panic if you don't receive an early offer, as course offers will be made on all offer-round dates (as published in the 2019 Year 12 Guide Guide). Check the Course Offer Dates page to find out when your institution will make offers.

Snippets for beginning university students

The following are summaries of recent articles on tertiary entry.

Five ways to tell if uni is perfect for you – This article, from the <u>Year 13 website</u>, lists the following five criteria for selecting your perfect university. This information is based on steps in the University of Canberra's <u>Ultimate guide to selecting the right university</u>.

- Course selection Does the uni have the perfect course for you? Does the teaching environment meet your learning style (e.g. purely academic or more hands on)? Will you get an opportunity to study overseas as part of the course?
- Uni vibes Because uni is different to high school, you need to make sure the uni you pick will give you every chance to ace the course (upgrade pathways, bridging courses, assignment support, etc.).
- Support What support services are provided (e.g. career support, mental health and counselling options)?
- The fun stuff Sus out things like clubs and societies, sports teams, uni games, the uni bar, open days, orientation weeks, career seminars and all the other events the uni might offer.
- Location Can you realistically get to the uni? Are you prepared to leave home? If you don't like to travel much, check out unis that are close by.

Key dates for Year 12 students

Your secondary schooling days are almost finished. All that is left is to receive your results. The following are key dates for receiving these results:

- Your individual QCS Test grade (from A E) was released on 14 November 2018 in your learning account on the <u>Student Connect website</u>.
- Your Year 12 results will be available on Saturday 15 December 2018 in your learning account on the Student Connect website.
- On 14 December 2018 your <u>Senior Education Profile</u> (SEP) will be sent to you in the mail. Depending on your eligibility, your SEP will contain one or more of the following documents:
 - Queensland Certificate of Education
 - Tertiary Entrance Statement (containing your OP and FPs)
 - Senior Statement (listing your Year 11 and 12 subjects and results and your QCS Test grade)
 - Queensland Certificate of Individual Achievement.

You will need your LUI and password to access your learning account. Make sure you have these before you leave school on Friday 16 November 2018.

Australian Government: Bonded Medical Places (BMP) Scheme

This scheme is intended to provide more qualified medical practitioners for locations experiencing doctor shortages. In Australian medical schools, 28.5 % of all first-year Commonwealth Supported Places (CSP) are expected to be bonded through the BMP Scheme each year. The Scheme provides a CSP in an Australian medical school. Recipients of a BMP are required to work in a district of workforce shortage for a period equal to 12 months. This time can be worked in blocks of no less than 12 weeks. It can be completed between commencing an internship and five years after fellowship (specialisation) is achieved.

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The application and selection process for the scheme is the responsibility of the universities and usually takes place after an application to study medicine has been lodged. In the case of the University of Queensland, Year 12 students can apply for a Bonded Medical Place when they apply for the Doctor of Medicine (MD) Provisional Entry for School-Leavers (Bonded Medical Places) through QTAC. An information booklet about the BMP Scheme can be downloaded from the Department of Health website.

Bond: Campus tours at Bond University

If you want to discover more about what it's like to study at Bond, you can book a tour for yourself, your family and friends. The tour will be tailored to meet your individual interests. It will take approximately 45 minutes to one hour. Your guide (a current Bond student) will show you around the facilities, the practical teaching spaces and your faculty of interest.
